Dear Parents:

I am pleased that we are back to doing the many activities we previously did such as field trips. Field trips are a valuable part of a child's education and experiencing the opportunities that are provided by outside organizations are important. For some trips will use buses but many of our excursions rely on parent drivers. If parent drivers are used, it is essential to check that your child has an unexpired booster seat that fits properly. Legally, a child must be 40 lbs. to ride in a booster seat in Canada and children under 13 must ride in the backseat. Please be sure to check their weight and the expiry date of your current booster seat prior to sending them on a field trip. One of our parents, Stacey Kosturos, is a certified child passenger safety technician and is available for online or in person care seat consults and full care seat inspections. I have attached a few informational documents with her contact information included at the end of this newsletter.

Reminders for Parents

New Option to Access MyEDBC using your BC Services Card

On Monday, October 17, the Ministry of Education and Child Care together with Service BC is providing another option for students and parents/guardians to access MyEDBC. This new option enables students and families to link their BC Services Card Mobile Phone App to their MyEDBC account. By choosing this new method, all you would need is your BC Services Card Mobile Phone App to log into MyEDBC at any time. If a student or parent/guardian chooses this method, they will be able to go back to the old login method but will require assistance from District MyEDBC support staff. Moving forward with choosing this new option means that you will never need a username and password.

The old method of using a username and password to login to My EDBC will remain the same. There may be some students and families who do not want to use the new login method for reasons which may include:

- You are satisfied with the current process of using a username and password
- You don't have a BC Services Card

You don't have access or don't want to use a mobile phone or the BC Services Card App to log into My EDBC

FIELD TRIPS

Make sure to send your child with an appropriate seat for school field trips. The parent volunteer driver is liable for your child. Make sure to give your child proper instructions on how to use their seat and send the instruction manual. Make sure the seat is not missing pieces and is not expired.

BOOSTER SEATS

Legally, a child must be 40 lbs to ride in a booster seat in British Columbia. Many children are not developmentally mature enough for a booster seat at 40lbs and should remain in a five-point harness. A child in a booster seat must stay positioned properly for an entire car ride, including when asleep.

RIDING IN THE FRONT SEAT

Children aged 12 and under must ride in the backseat. There is no front seat law in British Columbia; however, vehicle manufactures prohibit children under the age of 13 to ride in the front seat. Air bags in the front seat can be deadly for a young child who doesn't have fully developed bones. Unless your vehicle airbag can be turned off with a switch (not a sensor) children need to ride in the backseat.

HARNESSED CAR SEAT


Many children who meet the legal requirements to ride in a booster seat still need a five-point harness car seat to fully protect them in a collision. If a child cannot sit properly for an entire car ride, including when asleep, then they need to remain in a five-point harness. Many children are ready for a booster seat around age 6 or 7. A forward facing harnessed seat legally must have the top tether attached to an approved tether anchor. Make sure to read your car seat manual and vehicle manual before installing your car seat.

Booster seat

How to keep your child safe in the car

A booster seat lifts your child up so that the seat belt fits across the strongest bones and away from the soft belly. To use a booster seat, your child must weigh at least 18 kg (40 pounds) and be able to sit correctly.

How to use your child's booster seat



Read your vehicle manual and follow the instructions for your seat.

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Is your child in the right seat?



Rear-facing seat

- A rear-facing seat provides the best protection for your child's head, neck and spine in a sudden stop or crash.
- When your baby outgrows the infant seat, use a larger, rear-facing seat.
- Your child is safest riding rear facing until 2, 3 or even 4 years old.
- Keep your child rear facing for as long as he or she still fits the larger, rearfacing seat.

Forward-facing seat

- A forward-facing seat protects a child who has outgrown his or her larger, rear-facing seat.
- Keep your child in a 5-point harness until he or she weighs at least 18 kg (40 pounds) and is able to sit correctly. This may be at 4, 5 or even 6 years old.
- If your child outgrows this seat before he or she is ready, you will need a 5-point harness seat that will hold a taller, heavier child.

Booster seat

- A booster seat lifts the child up so that the adult seat belt fits across the strongest bones.
- Your child must weigh at least 18 kg (40 pounds) to use a booster seat.
- Your child must be able to sit straight and tall without moving around or unbuckling.
- Use a booster seat until your child is at least 145 cm (4 feet 9 inches) tall and fits the seat belt correctly.

Always follow the instructions for your seat.
